It was the plot of an episode of the British series *Black Mirror*. It was 1984, anticipatory novel of a totalitarian and technological society. By 2020, as announced in 2014, China will put in place a rating system for its population that will take the form of a social credit.


You are a Chinese citizen, all your behaviors will be noted: Smoking? Cross the street at the red light? Bad grade. Flatter the Chinese regime and its economy, however, will give you points. Mobility will be at the heart of the system: you are poorly rated, the Chinese state may prohibit you access to airplanes and trains.

It was predictable the "Big data" is at the service of totalitarian regimes. It is time to question the use of our data and to address ethical issues.

Artists and designers have fully understood the potential of datas as a subject and are becoming more and more involved in their work.

Ethics of the data

O ther visual and aesthetic representation of the data, the artist addresses the nt in his criticism and political dimension. Of course, we are thinking of China, an illustration of the worst, but also the many debates related to the use of data.

In the space of the EDF Foundation an exhibition curated by David Bihanic (PhD) designer, with a real look and expertise of the data, brings together a dozen artists whose works use the data as material of creation.

There is *Casino Las Datas* by Albertine Meunier, Filipe Vilas-Boas and Sylvia Fredriksson. This Casino 2.0 materializes the Internet space where everyone plays to entrust his data, with almost nothing to win, a massive entertainment space as the artists name. The system is simple: according to the data they agree to deliver - email, phone number, twitter ID, etc. - visitors get a bucket of chips that they can then spend on machines. A nice wink full of humor and at the same time a critical posture of the use of our data.





Also in the exhibition 123 Data, the Austrian artist Herwig Scherabon with his *Income* inequality series Los Angeles, Chicago, New York, Paris highlights the social inequalities, creating a new landscape built by the cartographic division of average incomes by city that he raises these parcels in height. The verticality of the cities then responds to the standard of living of the residents. The work thus questions the notions of territory and living together.


